

Seven Springs General Camping Risk Assessment

This is a generic risk assessment for the camping areas. You will need to complete your own risk assessment for your own layout and any activities you carry out.

If necessary move all campers planned for potentially wet areas further up the camp site. This will require tents to be pitched much closer together and will require management of the pegs and guy ropes, etc 	M

<p>General Camping</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Slips, trips and falls ▪ Tents becoming wet if doors are not closed ▪ Attracting vermin if food is left in tents 	All	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Slips, trips and falls ▪ Personal belongings and sleeping kit may become wet 	M	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Tents and equipment to be checked on a daily basis ▪ Ensure any damaged tents are repaired/replaced by the Warden if they belong to Seven Springs ▪ Ensure participants keep personal belongings in their tent, e.g. wellies ▪ Ensure there is a spare sleeping bag ▪ Brief participants on camp site safety and good practice; including cleanliness, keeping tent doors closed, etc 	L
<p>Gas Boilers and Burners</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Gas ▪ Naked Flames ▪ Heavy equipment ▪ Boiling water ▪ Standing water 	All	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Burns, cuts, bruises, broken bones, • Fire • Gas leak • Standing water 	M	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Ensure water boilers are securely and safely placed - table on even ground, not in pathway, etc. ▪ The gas boiler and bottle should ideally be situated 5m from any sleeping canvas. ▪ Ensure gas bottle is outside of the tent with a hose of sufficient length to reach. ▪ Ensure water boiler turned off when not in use/unsupervised. ▪ Under 18s not to use the water boilers ▪ Provide suitable container for carrying hot water from the boiler, with two carrying points e.g. metal kettle ▪ Ensure gas water boilers lit using gas lighters provided - not matches. ▪ Ensure the water is emptied out an the end of each day and re filled in the morning 	M
